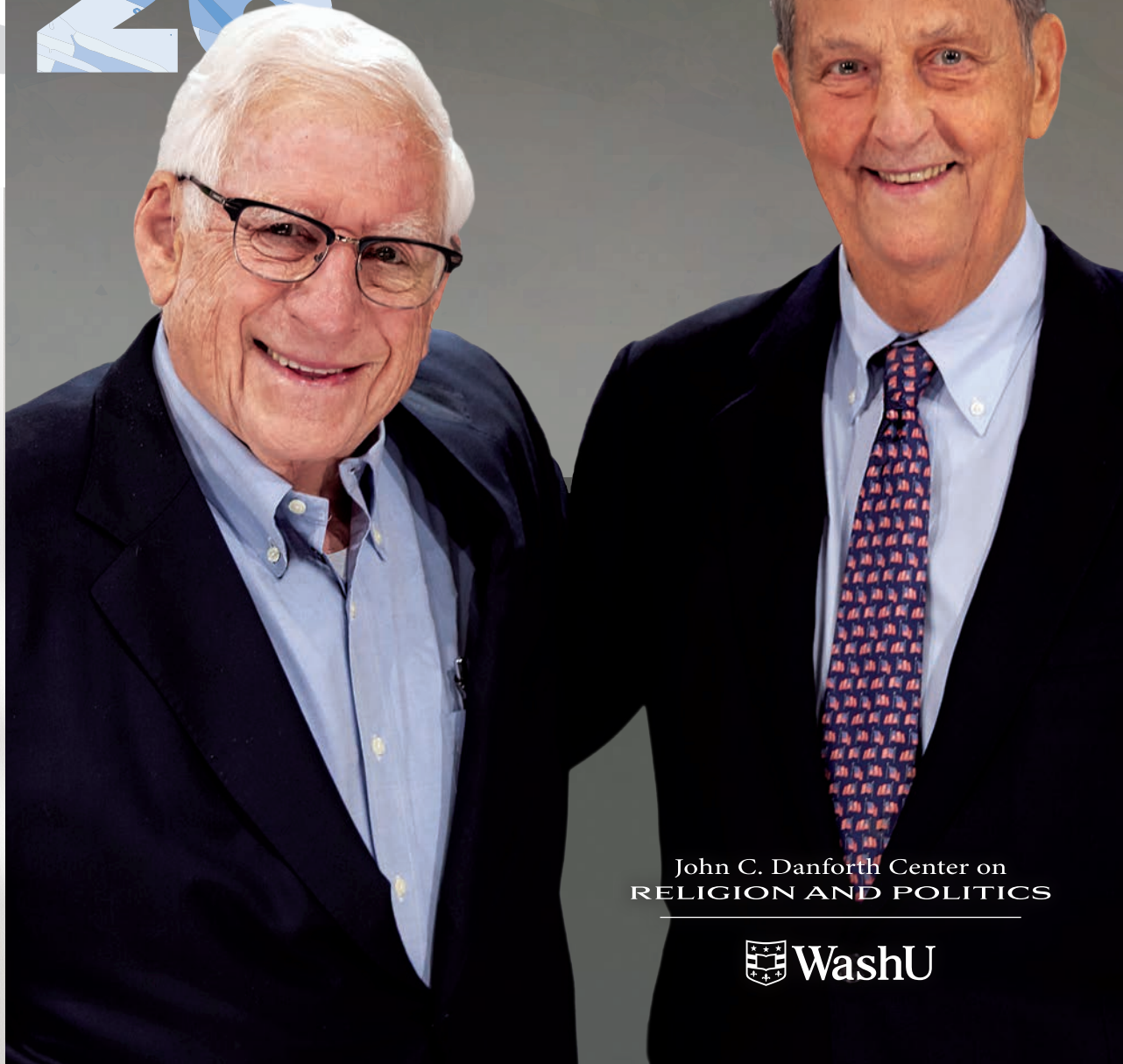

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LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

Greetings from all of us at the John C. Danforth Center on Religion and Politics.

From there, we explored race and democracy with the inimitable Ta-Nehisi Coates, hosted a Catholic-Jewish dialogue, and turned in spring to the nation's 250th anniversary of 1776. To further reflect on those national origins, we created a class with a series of speakers—now available to the public through our website!

We were especially honored this year to host a public dialogue between Senators Jack Danforth and Bill Bradley, who reflected on their friendship across political lines and challenged all of us to find a better politics now.

At the Danforth Center, we pursue scholarship that drives deep, projects that reach wide, and dialogues that seek greater understanding. While our faculty have long advanced this mission, I close with

particular gratitude to the staff who have supported their work and made it all possible. Their dedication sustains the Center. And for fifteen years, no one has kept it running so consistently, so smoothly, and so beautifully as Debra Kennard. Debra has been a stalwart champion of the Danforth Center from its founding moments forward. This year marks her last. As she retires, we close an era in which her hand touched everything the Center accomplished.

Research and Teaching

Courses

Coursework in the Center provides a foundation and structure for students to engage in critical reflection, research and scholarship, and analytic writing.

Courses cover a wide spectrum of topics related to the intersections of American religion and politics, ranging from economics and politics in the British colonies to persistent and contemporary issues such as nationalism and globalization, gender, race, and religious freedom.

The collective focus of the curriculum is the cultivation of research and interpretive skills necessary for practical analyzation and response to important issues that shape society and culture in the United States.

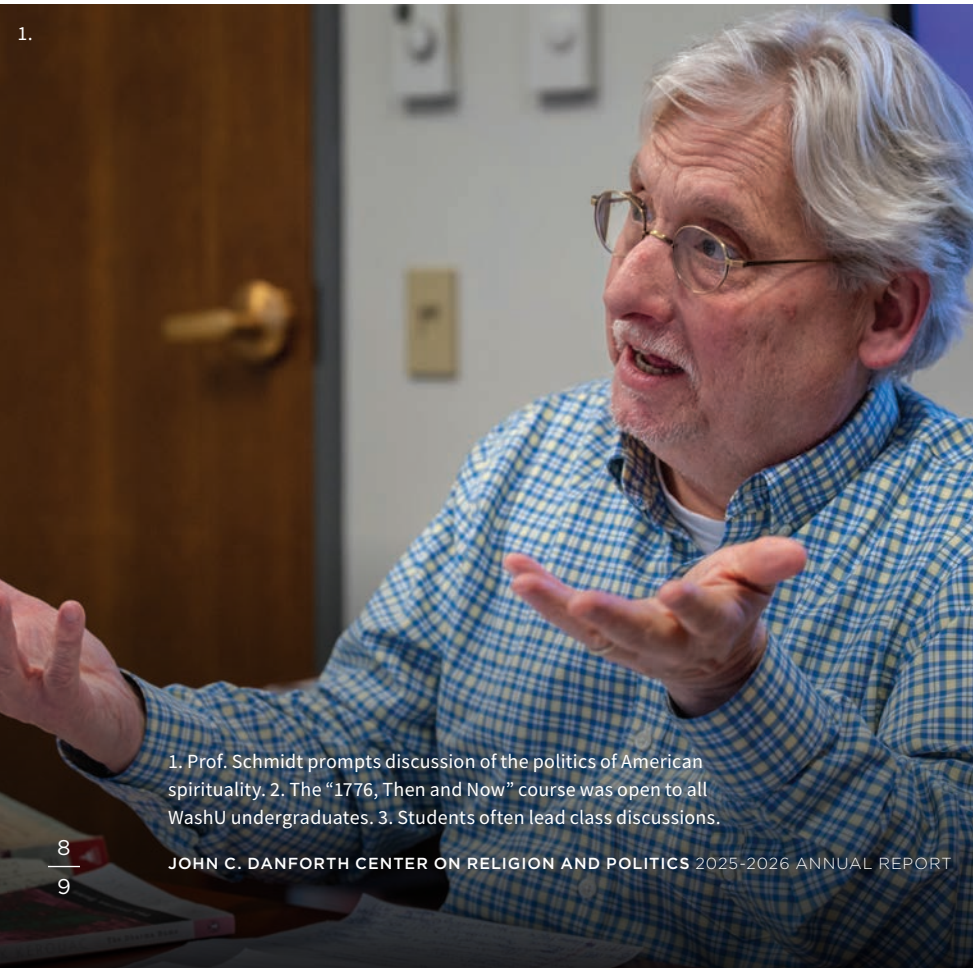
Religion, Politics, and Public Data: Telling Stories With Numbers

Undergraduate Minor

The Religion and Politics minor provides an opportunity for sustained exploration of the ways in which religion and politics have intersected in American culture, in both historical and contemporary terms.

As part of the minor program, students may examine any number of issues, including church-state relations, religion's role in shaping gender and sexuality debates, religion and electoral politics, public conflicts over religion and science, and religion's entwining with reform movements of diverse kinds. The Center's minor enrolls students from many disciplines, including natural sciences, social sciences, and humanities; whether pre-med, pre-law, or pursuing futures in education, business, or the arts, our graduates report their studies are enriched by our curriculum. Students with our minor have gone on to a variety of successful careers, including law, medicine, academia, business, and non-profit organizations.

The Danforth Center offered a special one-time course to explore that question by examining the American Revolution during its 250th anniversary. The class examined the founding of the United States from multiple perspectives and points of view, as well as the continuing relevance and consequences of those events. What happened, how did it happen, and why does it still matter?

*For searchers caught between doubt and belief and for believers struggling to reconcile faith with contemporary assumptions about science and progress, Ross Douthat's recent book **Believe: Why Everyone Should Be Religious**, shows how religious faith makes better sense of reality than skepticism or disbelief. This debate-style event featured *New York Times* columnist Douthat in conversation with Pitzer College professor and well-known atheist author Philip Zuckerman.*

This Danforth Distinguished Lecture featured award-winning author and journalist Ta-Nehisi Coates in a wide-ranging public conversation with Yale History Professor Elizabeth Hinton.

*Coates holds the Sterling Brown Endowed Chair at Howard University in the English department. His bestselling books include *The Water Dancer*, *The Message*, and 2015 National Book Award winner *Between the World and Me*. Hinton's research focuses on the persistence of poverty, racial inequality, and urban violence in the 20th century United States.*

Nostra Aetate is a declaration of the Second Vatican Council issued on October 28, 1965 that concerns the Catholic Church's relationship with non-Christian religions. The document, which means "In Our Time," repudiates anti-Semitism, rejects the charge of deicide against the Jews, and affirms the Church's shared spiritual heritage with Judaism and respect for Islam and other religions.

This event brought together several St. Louis organizations to reflect on the 60 years since the declaration and how to embrace the future. The Most. Rev. Archbishop Mitchell T. Rozanski and Rabbi Noam Marans, Director of Interreligious Affairs at the American Jewish Committee (AJC), joined together in a conversation moderated by Fr. David J. Suwalsky, St. Louis University's VP-Mission and Identity.

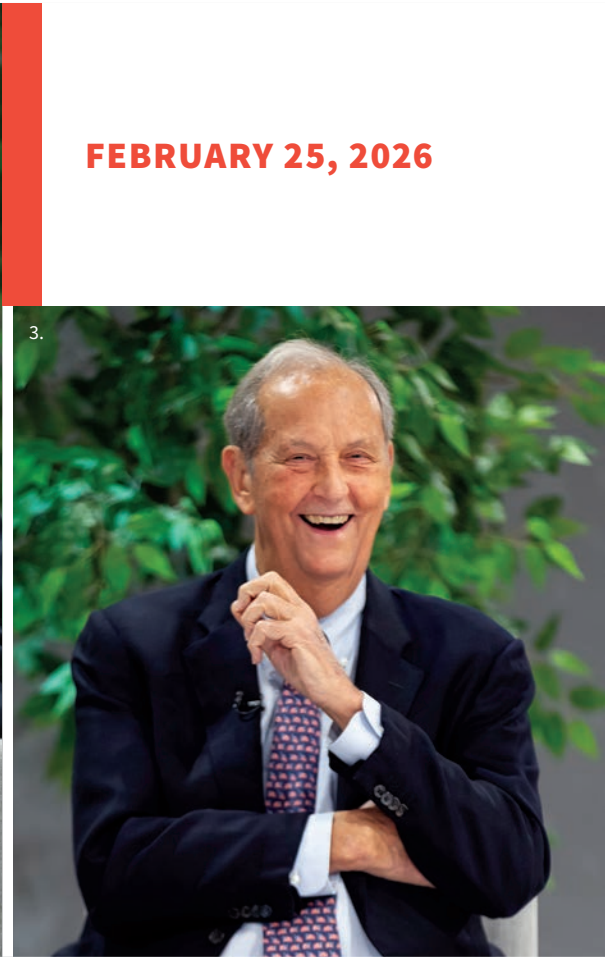


Recovering America: Keeping Our Republic in an Age of Broken Politics

In an era when American politics feels more broken than ever, two of the most respected voices of a different political age came together for a timely public conversation. Former U.S. Senators Bill Bradley and Jack Danforth reflected candidly—and personally—on how we got here, what has been lost, and what can be recovered. Drawing on stories of bipartisan friendship, faith, compromise, and public service, they explored what politics looks like at its best, what it means to be “a republic, if you can keep it,” and how ordinary citizens can help heal a fractured nation.

Many Americans currently find themselves wrestling and renegotiating their place in the American political landscape, and Asian American religious communities are no different as categories of race, ethnicity, generation, and religious tradition have become less stable and capable of predicting political affiliation or participation.

This public panel discussion featured experts of Asian American religion and politics to reflect on the place of Asian American religious identities and communities in the current political climate. Panelists were Russell M. Jeung, Professor of Asian American Studies at San Francisco State University and cofounder of Stop AAPI Hate; Bradley Onishi, scholar and cohost of the podcast Straight White American Jesus; and Deepa Sundaram, Associate Professor of Hindu Studies, Critical Theory, and Digital Religion at University of Denver.

One of the nation's most prominent scholars, Dr. Eddie S. Glaude Jr., is the James S. McDonnell Distinguished University Professor of African American Studies at Princeton University. This talk centered on themes in his book America, U.S.A.: How Race Shadows the Nation's Anniversaries. In this book, Glaude presents a groundbreaking analysis of the vicious cycles of American history and the country's enduring refusal to face its true nature—especially at the moments when national anniversaries steer us back toward the mythology meant to disguise the truth.

Danielle Allen is James Bryant Conant University Professor at Harvard University. She is also Director of the Allen Lab for Democracy Renovation at the Harvard Kennedy School and Director of the Democratic Knowledge Project, a research lab focused on civic education at the Harvard Graduate School of Education. She is a professor of political philosophy, ethics, and public policy as well as a seasoned non-profit leader, democracy advocate, tech ethicist, distinguished author, and mom.

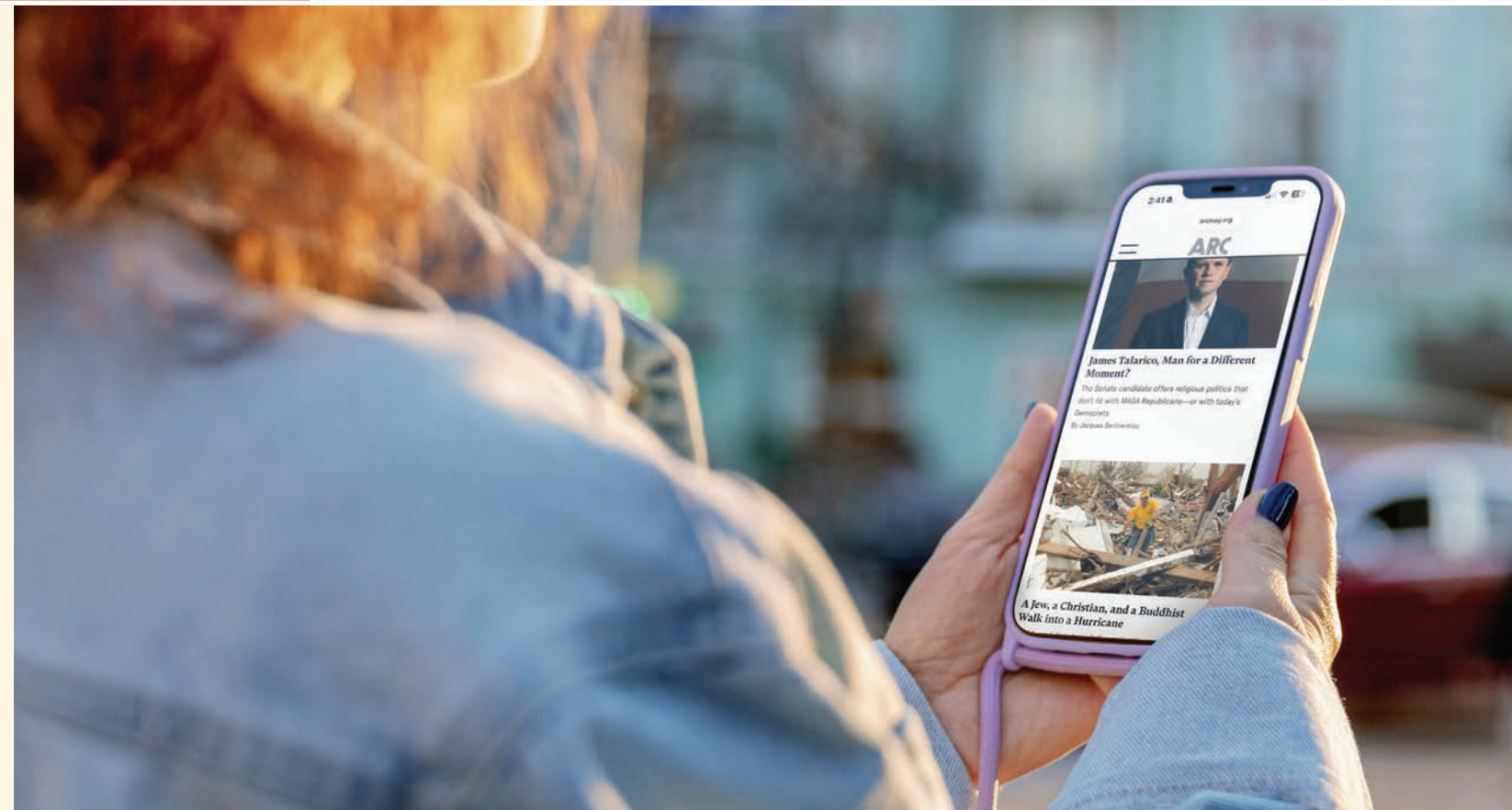
Online Journal

Arc: Religion, Politics, Et Cetera was the relaunch (under a new name) of the Center's former journal, *Religion & Politics*. Since beginning publication in September 2024, we have achieved our mission of providing a forum for writers from inside the academy and outside, of all (and no) partisan leanings. Besides running articles and essays, we have launched a successful podcast and hosted events in New York City and St. Louis (with an event upcoming in Washington, D.C., in October 2026).

TAZEEN M. ALI

Assistant Professor of Religion and Politics

Professor Ali's research and teaching focus on Islam and gender, race and religion in the U.S., and Muslims in popular culture. Her first book ***The Women's Mosque of America: Authority & Community in US Islam*** (NYU Press: November 2022) is the first full-length scholarly account of the phenomenon of woman-led mosques that have been emerging across North America and Europe since 2015, and it analyzes how American Muslim women negotiate the Islamic tradition to cultivate religious authority and build gender-equitable worship communities.

She is currently writing a book on narratives of masculinity, racism, and sexuality in entertainment media produced by American and British Muslims, tentatively titled ***Muslims on Screen: Racism and Sexuality in Anglo-American Islam*** (under contract with NYU Press). Ali frequently writes for public audiences with her work appearing in Public Books, *Arc: Religion, Politics, Et Cetera* (formerly *Religion & Politics*), *The Conversation*, *Middle East Eye*, and *The Maydan*. She also serves on the advisory board of the National Museum of American Religion.

Ali earned her Ph.D. in Religious Studies with a graduate certificate in Women's Gender, and Sexuality Studies from Boston University in 2019. She was a visiting postgraduate student in Islamic Studies at the University of Edinburgh from 2017 to 2018. Prior to that she obtained a master's degree in Islamic Studies from Washington University in St. Louis and her bachelor's degree with honors in both religion and biology from Lehigh University. Competitive fellowships and grants from The Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation, the Boston University Center for the Humanities, and Center for Islam in the Contemporary World have supported her writing and research.



Faculty

FANNIE BIALEK

Assistant Professor of Religion and Politics

Professor Bialek's research and teaching focus on contemporary religious ethics and political theory with an emphasis on feminist thought, Christian theology, and modern forms of power critique. Her first book project, ***Love in Time***, argues for a consideration of love as a relationship to uncertainty, instructive for the vulnerabilities of interpersonal relationships and political life. Her next book will consider Abraham Joshua Heschel's 1951 book ***The Sabbath*** for contemporary democratic politics. She teaches one of the Center's gateway lecture courses for undergraduates, "The Good Life between Religion and Politics," among other courses in religious ethics and political thought.

Her appointment with the Danforth Center on Religion and Politics follows her position as Lecturer with the Religious Studies program at Washington University in St. Louis for the 2016-2017 academic year. She was Visiting Assistant Professor in Religious Studies at Brown in 2015-2016.

Bialek earned the Ph.D. in Religious Studies from Brown University in 2016. She earned a bachelor's degree in religion, *summa cum laude*, from Princeton University. Competitive fellowships from the Center for the Humanities at WashU, the American Association of University Women, the Cogut Center for the Humanities at Brown, and the Pembroke Center for Teaching and Research on Women at Brown have offered support for her research.

Bialek also leads a summer program for St. Louis-area high school students to study political thought, generously funded by the Teagle Foundation's Knowledge for Freedom Program.



Faculty

RYAN BURGE

Professor of Practice

Ryan Burge is a professor of practice at the John C. Danforth Center at Washington University in St. Louis. He will teach undergraduate courses through the Department of Political Science. Burge is a political scientist whose research focuses on the impact of religion on American life, especially politics. His popular Substack newsletter “Graphs about Religion” has tens of thousands of subscribers and is read millions of times annually. He is a well-known data analyst with work appearing in *The New York Times*, *The Wall Street Journal*, and *POLITICO*, and he has been featured on *60 Minutes*.

He previously served for 13 years in the political science department at Eastern Illinois University, where he was also the graduate coordinator. He earned his undergraduate degree in history/political science from Greenville University and his M.A. and Ph.D. in political science from Southern Illinois University, Carbondale. Following his doctoral work, he served as a postdoctoral fellow at the Paul Simon Public Policy Institute, where he advised on polling and data analysis.

Dr. Burge is the author of five books. His debut, *The Nones: Where They Came From, Who They Are, and Where They Are Going* (Fortress Press, 2021), explores the dramatic rise of non-religious Americans and offers explanations for this seismic cultural shift. His next book, *20 Myths about Religion and Politics in America* (Fortress Press, 2022), addressed widespread misconceptions about religion, politics, and their intersection. In 2023, he collaborated with pastors Michael Graham and Jim Davis to write *The Great Dechurching: Who’s Leaving, Why Are They Going, and What Will It Take to Bring Them Back?* (Zondervan). Based on three original surveys, this work investigates the reasons behind declining church attendance in the United States. In 2024, he published *The American Religious Landscape: Facts, Trends, and the Future* (Oxford University Press), an accessible, data-rich overview of religious groups including Protestants, Catholics, Muslims, Hindus, and atheists. His most recent book, *The Vanishing Church: How the Hollowing Out of Moderate Congregations Is Hurting Democracy, Faith, and Us* (Brazos, 2026), examines religious polarization and its broader implications for American society.

Burge served as a pastor in the American Baptist Church for over twenty years.

R. MARIE GRIFFITH

John C. Danforth Distinguished
Professor in the Humanities

Marie Griffith is the John C. Danforth Distinguished Professor in the Humanities at Washington University in St. Louis. She served for 12 years (2011-2023) as the director of the John C. Danforth Center on Religion and Politics and the editor of the Center’s journal, *Religion & Politics*. Her research focuses on American Christianity, including the changing profile of American evangelicals and ongoing conflicts over gender, sexuality, and marriage.

Professor Griffith obtained her undergraduate degree at the University of Virginia in Political and Social Thought and her Ph.D. in the study of religion from Harvard University. Before moving to Washington University in 2011, she served as professor of religion and director of the women and gender studies program at Princeton University, where she was awarded the President’s Award for Distinguished Teaching; and later as the John A. Bartlett Professor of New England Church History at Harvard. In 2015 she was appointed a Distinguished Lecturer for the Organization of American Historians.

Griffith is the author or editor of seven books. Her first, *God’s Daughters: Evangelical Women and the Power of Submission* (University of California Press, 1997), examines the practices and perceptions of contemporary evangelical women. Her next book, *Born Again Bodies: Flesh and Spirit in American Christianity* (University of California Press, 2004), explores the history of Christian-influenced attitudes and practices related to embodiment in modern America; while *Moral Combat: How Sex Divided American Christians and Fractured American Politics* (Basic Books, 2017) traces conflicts over sexual morality, feminism, and gender in American religion and politics. Her latest book, *Making the World Over: Confronting Racism, Misogyny, and Xenophobia in U.S. History* (UVA Press, 2021), urges a re-reading of the nation’s history that opens up greater complexity than our stock narratives. These books, along with her three edited volumes—*Women and Religion in the African Diaspora: Knowledge, Power, and Performance* (co-edited with Barbara Dianne Savage, Johns Hopkins University Press, 2006), *Religion and Politics in the Contemporary United States* (co-edited with Melani McAlister, Johns Hopkins University Press, 2008), and *American Religions: A Documentary History* (Oxford University Press, 2007)—exhibit Griffith’s varied research interests. In addition to her books, Professor Griffith has published numerous scholarly articles, book chapters, and essays.

Griffith is a frequent media commentator and public speaker on current issues pertaining to religion and politics. She is currently writing the first in-depth comparative history of the clergy sexual abuse crises within American Christianity, focusing on the U.S. Catholic Church and evangelical groups such as the Southern Baptist Convention.

MARK OPPENHEIMER

Professor of Practice and Executive Editor,
Arc: Religion, Politics, Et Cetera

Mark Oppenheimer joined the Center in May 2024 and brings a wealth of experience in journalism and academia. He has taught at Stanford, Wesleyan, Wellesley, NYU, Boston College, and Yale, where he was the founding director of the Yale Journalism Initiative. From 2010 to 2016, he wrote the “Beliefs” column, about religion, for *The New York Times*, and he has also written for publications including *The New Yorker*, *The Nation*, *GQ*, *Slate*, and *The Wall Street Journal*. He created *Unorthodox*, the world’s most popular podcast about Jewish life and culture, with over 7 million downloads to date and the podcast *Gatecrashers*, about the history of Jews and antisemitism at Ivy League schools. He has also hosted the podcasts *Antisemitism USA* and, from the Leo Baeck Institute, *LBI Presents*.

Oppenheimer is the author of five books, including the co-authored *The Newish Jewish Encyclopedia*, *Squirrel Hill: The Tree of Life Synagogue Shooting and the Soul of a Neighborhood* and, most recently, *Judy Blume: A Life*. He is currently working on a study of an antisemitism scandal at Princeton in 1958.

Oppenheimer holds a Ph.D. in religious studies from Yale.

LEIGH ERIC SCHMIDT

Edward C. Mallinckrodt Distinguished
University Professor in the Humanities

Leigh Eric Schmidt is the Edward C. Mallinckrodt Distinguished University Professor in the Humanities at Washington University in St. Louis. He joined the John C. Danforth Center on Religion and Politics in 2011. From 2009 to 2011, he was the Charles Warren Professor of the History of Religion in America at Harvard University; from 1995 to 2009, he taught at Princeton University where he was the Agate Brown and George L. Collord Professor of Religion and served as chair of the Department of Religion; and, from 1989 to 1995, he taught in the Theological and Graduate Schools of Drew University. He has held research fellowships at Stanford and Princeton and also through the National Endowment for the Humanities, the American Council of Learned Societies, the American Philosophical Society, and the Guggenheim Foundation. In 2015 he was appointed a Distinguished Lecturer for the Organization of American Historians.

Schmidt is the author of *Hearing Things: Religion, Illusion, and the American Enlightenment* (Harvard, 2000), which won the American Academy of Religion Award for Excellence in Historical Studies and the John Hope Franklin Prize of the American Studies Association; *Heaven’s Bride: The Unprintable Life of Ida C. Craddock, American Mystic, Scholar, Sexologist, Martyr, and Madwoman* (Basic, 2010); *Restless Souls: The Making of American Spirituality* (HarperOne, 2005), which appeared in an updated edition from the University of California Press in 2012; *Consumer Rites: The Buying and Selling of American Holidays* (Princeton, 1995); and *Holy Fairs: Scottish Communion and American Revivals in the Early Modern Period* (Princeton, 1989), which received the Brewer Prize from the American Society of Church History. In addition, Schmidt has served as co-editor with Sally Promey of *American Religious Liberalism* (Indiana University Press, 2012), co-editor with Laurie Maffly-Kipp and Mark Valeri of *Practicing Protestants: Histories of the Christian Life in America* (Johns Hopkins University Press, 2006), and co-author with Edwin Scott Gaustad of *The Religious History of America* (HarperOne, 2002). *Village Atheists: How America’s Unbelievers Made Their Way in a Godly Nation* (Princeton University Press, 2016) examines how atheists and freethinkers have fared in American public life. His most recent book, *The Church of Saint Thomas Paine: A Religious History of American Secularism*, was published by Princeton University Press in November 2021.

Schmidt earned his undergraduate degree in history and religious studies from the University of California, Riverside, in 1983 and his Ph.D. in religion from Princeton in 1987.

MARK VALERI

Reverend Priscilla Wood Neaves Distinguished
Professor of Religion and Politics

Mark Valeri came to Washington University from Union Presbyterian Seminary in Richmond, Virginia, where he served as the Ernest Trice Thompson Professor of Church History beginning in 1996. His prior appointment was in the Religious Studies department at Lewis and Clark College. He has focused his research and writing on the ways in which religious ideas shaped political and economic affairs in seventeenth-century and eighteenth-century England and America.

His latest book describes how Anglo-American Protestant descriptions of other religions, and conversion from one religion to another, changed from 1650 to 1765: *The Opening of the Protestant Mind: How Anglo-American Protestants Embraced Religious Liberty* (Oxford University Press, 2023). It received the 2024 Philip Schaff Prize from the American Society of Church History. *Heavenly Merchandize: How Religion Shaped Commerce in Puritan America* (Princeton University Press, 2010) received the 2011 Philip Schaff Prize from the American Society of Church History. It was also shortlisted for the 2011 American Academy of Religion Award for Excellence in the Historical Study of Religion and selected as one of *Choice* magazine's Outstanding Academic Titles for 2010. The book analyzes social transformations in the American economy from the early 1600s, when Puritans argued that personal profit should be subordinate to the common welfare, to the 1740s, when Christians increasingly celebrated commerce as an unqualified good. Previous publications include *Law and Providence in Joseph Bellamy's New England: The Origins of the New Divinity in Revolutionary America* (Oxford University Press, 1994), which won the Mackemie Prize from the Presbyterian Historical Society; *The Works of Jonathan Edwards, Vol. 17: Sermons and Discourses, 1730-1733* (Yale University Press, 1999); *Practicing Protestants: Histories of Christian Life in America, 1630-1965* (The Johns Hopkins University Press, 2006), co-edited with Laurie F. Maffly-Kipp and Leigh E. Schmidt; and the co-edited *Global Neighbors: Christian Faith and Moral Obligation in Today's Economy* (Eerdmans, 2008). His publication list includes many book chapters, journal articles, and essays.

Valeri has received several fellowships, including an Andrew W. Mellon fellowship, a National Endowment for the Humanities fellowship, an American Council of Learned Societies grant, and a Lilly Endowment faculty fellowship, as well as the 2017-2018 *Los Angeles Times* Distinguished Fellowship in the History and Culture of the Americas at The Huntington Library in Pasadena, California. In 2027, he will be a visiting Beaufort Fellow at St. John's College, Cambridge University.

ABRAM VAN ENGEN

Stanley Elkin Professor in the Humanities

Abram Van Engen is the Stanley Elkin Professor of the Humanities and Director of the John C. Danforth Center on Religion and Politics at Washington University in St. Louis. He is appointed as well in the English Department and served that department as chair from 2022-2026.

Van Engen writes and teaches on religion and literature, with a focus on early America and its many afterlives. He is the author of *Sympathetic Puritans: Calvinist Fellow-Feeling in Early New England* (Oxford University Press, 2015), which engages the history of emotions to examine how a theology of sympathy shaped community and literature in New England. His second book, *City on a Hill: A History of American Exceptionalism* (Yale University Press, 2020), won the Peter J. Gomes Memorial Book Award and the Jaroslav Pelikan Prize. The book offers a cultural history of John Winthrop's 1630 "city on a hill" sermon, "A Model of Christian Charity," tracing its rise from obscurity to its place as a cornerstone of American exceptionalism, showing how national narratives are both constructed and contested.

More recently, Van Engen's work has turned to poetry. His recent book *Word Made Fresh: An Invitation to Poetry for the Church* (Eerdmans, 2024), was named the Best Book of 2024 in Culture, Poetry, and the Arts from *Christianity Today*. That book draws from his award-winning podcast, *Poetry For All*, now entering its sixth year. Most recently, Van Engen has published *Anne Bradstreet Now: Modern Poets Respond* (Oxford University Press, 2026), combining his interest in puritans with his love of modern poetry.

Van Engen earned his Ph.D. and M.A. from Northwestern University and his B.A. in English and Philosophy from Calvin University (2003).
